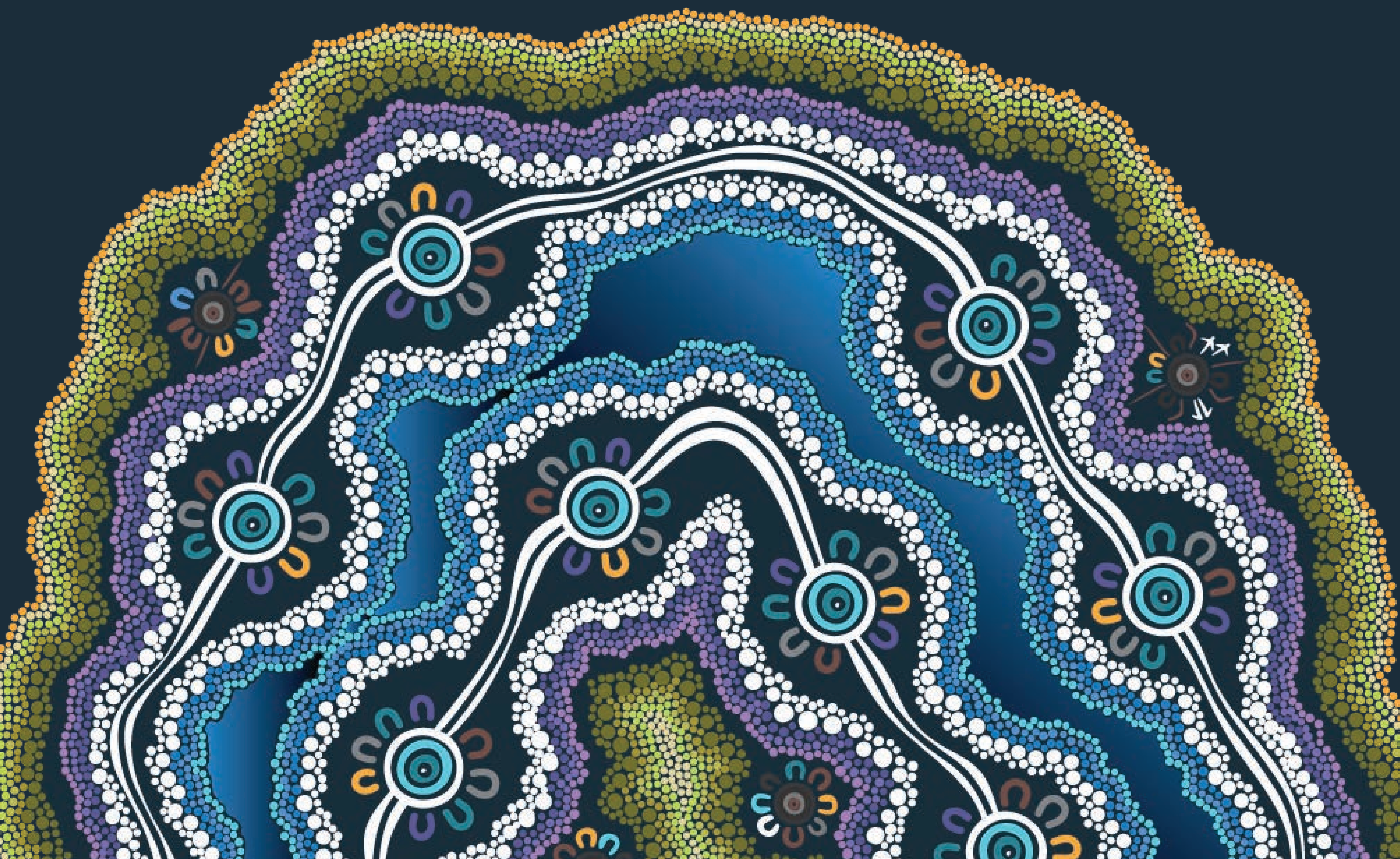


Acknowledgement of Country

Heritage

Noarlunga First Nations heritage and engagement

The name Noarlunga is an English adaptation of the native Kurna word for Nurlongga, meaning ‘at the curvature’. It refers to the horseshoe bend close to the mouth of the nearby Onkaparinga River.

Renewal SA is committed to reconciliation and is working closely with First Nations organisations, Elders and community members through the master-planning stages and across the lifecycle of the Noarlunga project to ensure First Nations culture and

heritage is acknowledged and managed appropriately.

Noarlunga is a greenfield site that has not previously been developed. Several Aboriginal cultural heritage assessment and field survey’s have been undertaken including a recent survey commissioned by Renewal SA with participation of Kurna representatives.

Aboriginal traditional owners have confirmed the anthropological significance of the project site.

The known archaeological presence in the region and associated flora and fauna are highly significant to Aboriginal people as they are part of a connective cultural landscape that, in the wider context of the coastal environs, contain high ethnographic values associated with the Dreaming as well as potential for remnant archaeological values and significance according to Aboriginal history and archaeology.

State heritage

There is a State Heritage Place located within the south-western portion of the project site.

Development adjacent to a State and/or Local Heritage Place must maintain the heritage and cultural values of those places. It should ensure that built form does not dominate, encroach on, or unduly impact on the setting of the place. Planning and design of the Noarlunga project site will respect and thoughtfully consider neighbouring community assets. Any interfaces are being designed in a co-ordinated way that enhances the overall flow and use of the space.

Sustainability

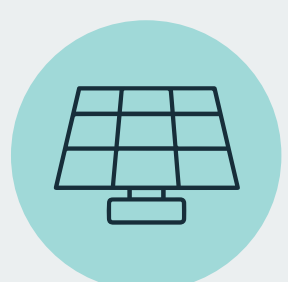
Renewal SA development considers the big picture – providing urgently needed housing for people, while also reducing our environmental impact and supporting communities to thrive.

Sustainable housing principles include:



Healthy, resilient and affordable communities

- ▼ Providing natural light access and good acoustics is healthier for people.
- ▼ Good connections to walking, public transport or cycle paths helps with affordability and convenience.
- ▼ All-electric homes eliminate gas bills and improve indoor air quality.



Striving for net zero carbon emissions and responsible construction

- ▼ Attention to design and smart materials choices helps reduce waste.
- ▼ Homes designed for energy efficiency require less energy to heat and cool, saving money every year.
- ▼ Being ready for electric cars, choosing efficient appliances and rooftop solar helps create low carbon lifestyles.



Connection to nature and place

- ▼ Green spaces are good for keeping cool, as well as providing valuable habitat for urban wildlife.
- ▼ On hot summer days, nearby shady trees help buildings run more efficiently.

Carbon emissions fact file

Around one-fifth of carbon emissions are generated by buildings in operation – mostly from electricity and gas use.

Australia has signed an international agreement to cut carbon emissions by 43% by 2030 compared to 2005 levels, in line with the science of what's required to avoid dangerous climate change.

South Australia has a target to be net zero by 2050.



Tonsley's solar system and district-wide energy scheme provides clean, locally-generated electricity to the businesses in the Tonsley Innovation District and residents of Tonsley Village.

Works Program
